## How to Help At Home

1. Help your child read his/her decodable books.
2. Insist that your child uses their finger to follow along as they read.
3. Read to your child in English or in Spanish.
4. Take your child to the library to check out books.
5. Talk to your child and ask him/her questions about what they are learning.

## HOMEWORK

**How much homework will my child receive?**

20 minutes of homework Monday through Thursday.

**What kinds of homework will my child receive?**

- **Decodable books.** Little white books. They should be read at home 3-5 times the night they go home and then reread again later. If your child is unable to read them independently, then someone at home may need to read the book to them until they can read them. **These are the most important homework your child will receive.**

- **Turtle Words.** Each week your child will receive 5 new sight words to learn which come right from the decodable books. These go home on Monday when your child needs to write sentences using the words. They will be tested on the words on Friday.

- **Math.** Students will receive regular math homework which coincides with what we are working on in class.

Sometimes students will also be asked to write stories for homework, will receive handwriting practice, and other miscellaneous assignments.
